Health Literacy - Defined

Personal Health Literacy

The degree to which **individuals** have the ability to **find**, **understand**, **and use** information and services to inform health-related **decisions and actions for themselves and others**.

Organizational Health Literacy

The degree to which **organizations** equitably enable individuals to **find**, **understand**, **and use** information and services to inform health-related **decisions and actions for themselves and others**.

Example: Health Information



Vaccines provide you with immunity against the COVID-19 virus to help keep everyone safe and slow the spread of COVID-19

Get vaccinated with a <u>free</u> and <u>safe</u> COVID-19 vaccine in downtown Frederick



Wednesdays, 2-4PM Visit the Evangelical Reformed United Church of Christ (ERUCC) on 15 W Church St for a vaccine



Thursdays, 12-1PM Visit the "Vax in the Box" mobile vaccine clinic (corner of Patrick and Market Streets) for a vaccine



Your child may feel tired, achy, or feverish for a few days after their vaccine.

This is a normal sign that their body is building protection against the virus.
