Board Actions & Decisions | December 16, 2022

The USM Board of Regents met at the <u>University of Maryland, Baltimore County</u> (UMBC) on December 16, 2022, with public viewing available in-person and via <u>livestream</u>. At this meeting, key actions by the Board included:

Approval of New Degree Programs. After reviewing the recommendations of the Committee on Education Policy and Student Life, the board approved six new academic programs, including a <u>Bachelor of Science in Biomedical Engineering</u> at the University of Maryland Eastern Shore (UMES). The proposed biomedical engineering (BME) program will significantly expand the capability of UMES, one of the USM's three historically Black institutions, to provide higher education opportunities that support the rural healthcare system. With expertise spanning physiology, biology, healthcare and health informatics, mechanics, and engineering, the graduates of this BME program will develop solutions that help improve patient treatment and lower the cost of care.

In addition to the BME program, the following new programs will be offered (pending approval of the Maryland Higher Education Commission):

- Doctor of Medical Science, University of Maryland, Baltimore (UMB)
- Bachelor of Science in Fashion Merchandising and Design, UMES
- Master of Science in Data Science and Analytics Engineering, UMES
- Master of Science in Electrical and Mechatronics Engineering, UMES
- Doctor pf Philosophy (Ph.D.) in Applied Computing and Engineering, UMES

Approval of a UMB Incubator for Small or Early-Stage Nonprofit Projects. The Board approved the creation of an <u>affiliated business entity at UMB</u>, which will provide small or early-stage nonprofit projects with financial, legal, and administrative services. This new incubator at UMB will seek to give nonprofits the resources they need to access funds from established foundations before the nonprofit has grown to handle such needs on its own.

Presentation of Updated USM Dashboard Indicators. Chad Muntz, Assistant Vice Chancellor for Institutional Research, Data and Analytics, provided a demonstration of the updated <u>USM Dashboard</u>, which includes more than 200 indicators of USM progress and success. A comprehensive source of current and historical data dating back to 2001, this interactive dashboard allows users to examine changes at both the System and institutional level. A drill-down capability is included for each indicator to explain the data sources, trend data, a summary of recent performance, and any available benchmarks based on peer performance, board policy, or institutional policy.

TOWSON PRESIDENT KIM SCHATZEL ANNOUNCES DEPARTURE AND USM NAMES PROVOST MELANIE PERREAULT AS INTERIM PRESIDENT

On November 30, Chancellor Perman shared the news that Towson University (TU) <u>President Kim</u> <u>Schatzel will depart the USM</u> to become the next president of the University of Louisville. Under her leadership, TU became one of the fastest growing USM institutions; experienced the largest capital investment in TU's 166-year history; accelerated its research activity; and closed the achievement gap for Black and Latinx students. <u>Dr. Melanie Perreault, TU's provost and executive vice president for academic and student affairs</u>, has been appointed to serve as the interim president beginning on February 1.

NEW PARTNERSHIP WILL HELP ADVANCE RESEARCH ON COLLEGE TEACHING AND LEARNING

A new partnership between the USM William E. Kirwan Center for Academic Innovation and the University of Maryland, College Park's Human Research Protection Program has led to the creation of a valuable new tool for researchers seeking to better understand the ways in which teaching and learning innovations can improve college students' academic performance. The partners have established a <u>systemwide</u> <u>Institutional Review Board protocol</u> for the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning (SoTL), which is designed to reduce barriers for faculty at 12 system institutions engaging in SoTL studies involving human participants.

THE USM OFFICE WELCOMES NEW LEADERS IN OFFICE OF ACADEMIC AND STUDENT AFFAIRS

This week, Chancellor Perman announced that Dr. Alison Wrynn will join the USM as the next senior vice chancellor for academic and student affairs, following the retirement of Joann Boughman early next year. Dr. Wrynn currently serves as associate vice chancellor for academic programs, innovations, and faculty development in the California State University's chancellor's office. She will lead the Office of Academic and Student Affairs, which earlier this month also welcomed Dr. Candace Caraco as associate vice chancellor for academic affairs. Dr. Caraco comes to the USM office from the University of Baltimore, where she served as associate provost.

THE UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND SCHOOL OF MEDICINE SEEKS VOLUNTEERS FOR THE "MY HEALTHY MARYLAND" STUDY

The "My Healthy Maryland Precision Medicine Research" study is a research study aimed at advancing understanding of the genetic and molecular basis of rare and common health conditions to develop better ways to prevent, diagnose, and treat both rare and common conditions. A joint initiative of the University of Maryland School of Medicine, the University of Maryland Medical Center and University of Maryland Medical System, the study will analyze genetic, health, lifestyle, and environmental data from 250,000 volunteers. Adults ages 18 and older who live in Maryland can <u>sign up to join</u> <u>the study</u>.
