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# **Board Actions & Decisions | June 13, 2025**

The USM Board of Regents met at the University System of Maryland at Hagerstown with public viewing available in-person and via <u>livestream</u>. Highlights from the meeting include:



Recognition of the 2025 Board of Regents Student
Excellence Scholars. This scholarship program honors
exceptional achievement by students attending USM
universities. Twelve \$2,000 scholarships funded by the
System and the USM Foundation are presented to
students across four categories: Academics,
Scholarship, and Research; Innovation and Creative
Activity; Leadership and Advocacy; and Outreach and
Engagement. Within each category, the Board
recognizes one freshman or sophomore, one junior or
senior, and one graduate or professional student. Last
month, the winners celebrated their achievements at a
special reception that included their families, Board
Chair Linda Gooden, Chancellor Jay Perman, and
several university presidents.

Educational Forum on USM Research at the Intersection of Science and Society. Michele Masucci, vice chancellor for research and economic development, presented an education forum on the impact of the System's research enterprise. She introduced faculty who shared how their research is improving health and longevity, advancing sustainability and solutions to climate change, or developing technologies that enhance the security and efficiency of businesses and government agencies. For example, Dr. Stuart S. Martin, deputy director of the Marlene and Stewart Greenebaum Comprehensive Cancer Center, shared how the center has connected more than 250 faculty investigators from four USM universities with a statewide network of hospitals to conduct more 300 clinical trials—providing Maryland patients with early access to experimental treatments. The forum video includes remarks by Dr. Martin; Dr. Xin Zhang, University of Maryland Center for Environmental Science; and Dr. Vandana Janeja and Dr. Nilanjan Banerjee, University of Maryland, Baltimore County. Dr. Masucci concluded the forum by summarizing threats to USM research, including cuts to federal research grants, and explained how our universities are coordinating their responses to these challenges.

Twelve New Programs Receive Board Approval. At the recommendation of the Committee on

Education Policy and Student Life and Safety, the Board approved the following new degree programs, which will be offered pending approval by the Maryland Higher Education Commission.

Board Approves the FY 2026 Schedule of Tuition and Mandatory Fees. Each year, the presidents of USM universities can recommend tuition and fee adjustments for the upcoming academic year. The Finance Committee shared the proposed rates for FY 2026 tuition and fees, which were approved by the Board. Across the System, in-state undergraduate full-time and part-time tuition rates will not increase by more than 4%. Out-of-state undergraduate, graduate, and professional rates will not increase by more than 5%. The Board also approved the proposed self-support charges and fees, which includes increases to room and board rates at some USM universities due to state-mandated salary and fringe benefit increases and rising costs for goods and services.

**Board Approves the USM FY 2026 Operating Budget.** The Board approved the USM's <u>FY 2026</u> operating budget authorized by the Maryland General Assembly. The total budget of approximately \$7.98 billion includes revenue from state appropriations, tuition and fees, auxiliary services, federal grants and contracts, and other sources. This represents a 7% year-over-year cut to the USM's base operating budget. During the meeting, Ellen Herbst, senior vice chancellor for administration and finance, <u>provided an overview of the operating budget</u>, the impact of the reductions in state and federal support, and the financial outlook for FY 2026 and beyond.

#### Thank You and Farewell



During the June meeting, the Board Chair Gooden and Chancellor Perman recognized several prominent USM leaders who are leaving their roles at the end of the fiscal year.

Leonard Raley, Vice Chancellor for Advancement, will retire on June 30, 2025, following nearly 20 years as the USM's chief advancement officer and president and CEO of the USM Foundation. His contributions include guiding the Foundation through its first-ever strategic planning process, instituting a robust enterprise risk management process to safeguard System resources, adding five Maryland community college foundations to the Foundation's

partners in asset management, and launching an advocacy program to raise the System's visibility among legislators. In recognition of his exceptional leadership and service, he has been named president emeritus of the Foundation.



Eileen Abel, Executive Director, is retiring this summer, after leading the University System of Maryland at Southern Maryland (USMSM) for nearly five years and developing a strategic plan that will guide the next five. Her efforts in building and fortifying partnerships—in education, research, innovation, economic development—advanced the USM's work to expand education opportunities throughout Southern Maryland.

## NEW GOOGLE PARTNERSHIP WILL BRING GOOGLE CAREER CERTIFICATES AND AI TRAINING TO USM STUDENTS

The USM and Google have announced a new partnership that will help thousands of USM students and other Maryland learners earn **Google Career Certificates** in high-growth fields including cybersecurity, data analytics, and project management at no cost. On June 17, leaders from the USM and Google gathered at the University of Baltimore to celebrate this important development, which will advance our universities' efforts to prepare learners for an artificial intelligencefocused economy. The William E. Kirwan Center for Academic Innovation will spearhead the rollout of Google Career Certificates and AI courses across all 12 USM universities and two of the System's regional higher education centers. This partnership also advances the USM's and Google's shared goal of supporting military-affiliated learners with career-focused training that helps them translate their experience into credentials.

# MARYLAND MOMENTUM FUND ADDS TO ITS GROWING PORTFOLIO OF USM-AFFILIATED COMPANIES

Last month, the USM's Maryland Momentum Fund announced that it had joined funding rounds for two companies with strong ties to the USM. CoapTech Inc. was founded by Dr. Steven Tropello, faculty at the University of Maryland, Baltimore (UMB), with co-founder Howard Carolan. While working clinically at UMB, Dr. Tropello invented the company's PUMA System™, which enables minimallyinvasive surgical procedures in hollow organs using point-of-care ultrasound. Omega 3 Nutrition, Inc. was founded by Bright Djampa while he was a nutritional food science student at the University of Maryland, College Park. Omega 3 Nutrition offers a growing line of plant-based, brain-boosting food products designed to support cognitive health and overall wellness. The Maryland Momentum Fund provides late seed investment funding for promising technology ventures developed by USM universities and research parks and their students, graduates, faculty, and staff.
