Leadership for All: Expanding Access to Graduate Education with Microcredentials

Allison Jones, Assistant Vice Provost of Extended Studies, University of Maryland, Baltimore County **Collin Sullivan**, Program Director for Digital Credential Innovation, University of Maryland, Baltimore County

In 2017, UMBC initiated the development of a 30-credit Community Leadership Master's program, which launched in 2019. However, many prospective students—particularly those from underrepresented backgrounds—faced barriers like admission requirements, financial constraints, or career-stage limitations that prevent them from enrolling in a traditional graduate program. To address these challenges, UMBC's Institute for Extended Learning (IXL) developed the Community Leadership Skills microcredential series, designed to serve both non-traditional learners and graduate students. This initiative provides a stackable, flexible learning pathway and each microcredential is aligned with NACE Career Competencies. Participants will gain actionable strategies for leveraging microcredentials to bridge higher education and workforce development, making graduate-level learning more equitable, accessible, and career-driven.

Open Educational Resources for Student Success

Open educational resources (OER) are freely available, fully accessible instructional materials with superpowers that help pave the way for greater access, affordability, and achievement for students. This session will introduce OER and highlight how they can be leveraged for student success. Participants will hear the story of the creation of the University of Baltimore's OER publication, <u>First-Year Seminar: An Academic Success Guide to Your First Year</u> (C. Miller, B. Richmond, L. Mathews, & J. Boettinger, 2021) and consider how they might leverage that OER and others like it in their own institutional contexts.

Creating Recovery-Friendly Campuses

This workshop seeks to explore how faculty and staff can support students who are in recovery from or impacted by substance use disorder (SUDs). The presenter will share insightful facts and figures as well as various ways to incorporate allyship into our work, whether it be in the classroom or other spaces where we interact with students. Given the increasing amount of fatal substance overdoses and the party culture often associated with college life, it is imperative that higher education professionals know how to support recovery efforts. By consciously considering how we engage with this student population, higher education professionals can work to create recovery-friendly campuses that not only dismantle the stigma associated with SUDs but also promote inclusivity.

The UJIMA Center at Bowie State University is a national model for improving access, equity, and student success for underrepresented students. Supported by a \$5 million U.S. Department of Education grant, UJIMA is a pioneering initiative designed to enhance recruitment, retention, and graduation rates by integrating culturally responsive support systems into the student experience. This session will explore how UJIMA utilizes evidence-based practices to create a holistic framework that supports underrepresented students from enrollment to career placement. Attendees will learn about the Center's research-driven strategies, including targeted mentorship, trauma-informed advising, and data-informed interventions that address the unique challenges faced by first-generation and minority students.

Empowering Non-Clinical Staff to Support Student Success

This presentation will explore the vital role of non-clinical staff in managing clinical conversations to improve student access to mental health support. Often the first point of contact, non-clinical staff are critical in bridging the gap between students and counselors. However, psychological jargon can create confusion regarding what constitutes a formal diagnosis and what reflects temporary discomfort, complicating these initial interactions. The session will address how non-clinical staff can be trained to distinguish between these nuances and respond appropriately, ensuring that students receive timely and effective care. By empowering non-clinical staff to navigate these conversations confidently, institutions can reduce barriers to care, enhance access, and promote equity in support services.

Partners in Learning: How Peer Mentorship Cultivates Success Beyond the Classroom

This presentation examines peer mentorship in undergraduate education and its impact on student success. Research demonstrates that these reciprocal relationships benefit both parties: mentees show improved academic performance, engagement, and retention, while mentors develop leadership skills and deeper field commitment. Peer mentorship extends beyond classrooms into co-curricular spaces like community service and team projects, addressing emotional and social aspects of education. By integrating peer mentorship into multiple frameworks, institutions create comprehensive environments preparing students for future success. Towson University's Public Communication Center serves as a model for extending traditional understandings of peer mentoring across curricular and extracurricular contexts.

Training Faculty and Staff to Report Student Behavior Objectively in a CARE Report

Rae Chresfield, Assistant Vice President for Health and Wellbeing, University of Maryland, Baltimore County

Accurate and objective reporting of student behavior is essential for effectively addressing concerns through the CARE and/or BIT systems. This session will focus on training faculty and staff to distinguish between objective and subjective language when submitting CARE reports. Faculty and staff are often the first to notice changes in student behavior, but without proper training, reports can be influenced by personal biases or emotions. This session will provide practical tools for identifying objective, factual observations and avoiding subjective interpretations. By training faculty and staff to report behaviors objectively, we can ensure that all students receive the appropriate support and intervention, without the risk of bias influencing the process.
